

Dear Faithfuls,

August 1, 2023, marks the one-year anniversary of my arrival here at Faith Church. I have spent the last year being very grateful to be among you – yes, me, who was never going to serve a church again!

Here's what I've seen in the last year:

Increased worship attendance. Last August, average attendance was 69 worshippers. This most recent July, average attendance was 74. That's a 7% increase!

Your Discipleship Team offering new educational events, from a class on the book of Revelation, to events for grandparents and grandchildren, to a current events class.

The Clothing Giveaway was twice a year in the past. Now it is monthly, with people coming from as far as North Omaha to receive clothing. Last month, 31% of the people that attended were immigrants – we are serving those in need! (Also, we have just applied for a grant from the Nebraska Presbyterian Foundation to support this mission outreach.)

Hosting Crossroads Connection three times this year, rather than once a year. And, making the clothing available to the ex-offenders.

Pickleball!

The puppet team offering great music during worship, as well as a special performance this past year.

An openness on the part of the session and the congregation to discover a new mission statement – listening to where God is calling us to be.

Parkinson's Disease

What is Parkinson's disease?

It is a neurological disease; the first signs are problems with movement. Early signs of Parkinson's disease may go unrecognized. It may be many years before movement difficulties begin with these warning signs.

Stages of Parkinson's disease:

Stage 1

This is the mildest form and you may not have noticeable symptoms. Your daily life is unaffected. If you do have symptoms, it is likely to only effect one side of the body. Some early symptoms are decreasing sense of smell, constipation, changes in handwriting, voice changes and stooped posture.

Stage 2

Progression to Stage 2 may take months or even years. Each person's experience is unique.

- ◆You may experience muscle stiffness, tremors, changes in facial expressions and trembling.
- ◆It may take longer to accomplish daily tasks.
- ◆Balance problems are usually not problems at this stage.
- ♦ Symptoms are noted on both sides of the body, these include: changes in posture, gait, and facial expressions.

Stage 3

- Symptoms become more noticeable.
- ♦ Movements are slower, activities are effected.
- ◆Balance issues are more significant, falls are more common.

People in this stage can usually maintain their independence and complete activities without much assistance.

Stage 4

- ♦ significant changes occur
- ♦a walker or assistive device is required to stand up
- ◆reactions and muscle movements are much slower
- living alone can be unsafe or dangerous

Stage 5

- ◆ severe symptoms require around-theclock assistance
- ◆difficult if not impossible to stand; a wheel chair may be required
- may experience confusion, delusions, hallucinations

. Secondary symptoms:

- ♦ blank facial expression
- getting stuck when walking
- •muffled, low volume speech
- ♦ decrease in blinking and swallowing
- ♦ falling backward
- reduction in arm swinging with walking
- ◆ shuffling steps when walking (Parkinsonian gate)
- ♦ flaky white or yellow scales on oily parts of the skin (seborrheic dermatitis)
- ♦ increase risk of melanoma
- ♦ depression/anxiety
- ♦ hallucinations
- ◆psychosis
- problems with attention and memory
- ♦ difficulty with visual-spatial relationships

Parkinson's dementia:

About 50-80% of people with Parkinson's will develop dementia. The person may have difficulty reasoning, thinking and problem solving. Symptoms include depression, sleep disturbances, hallucinations, mood swings, slurred speech, changes in appetite, and changes in energy levels. Highest risk populations are male, older in age, memory or cognitive issues before diagnosis of Parkinson's and a person with severe Parkinson's symptoms such as rigid muscles and difficulty walking.

Causes of Parkinson's disease:

Parkinson's disease may have both a genetic and environmental cause. Some scientists think that viruses can trigger Parkinson's.

Low levels of dopamine and norepinephrine (which regulates dopamine) have been linked to Parkinson's.

Abnormal proteins known as Lewy bodies have been found in the brain of people with Parkinson's. It is unknown if these play a role in the development of Parkinson's.

- ♦ Men are one and one-half times more likely to get Parkinson's.
- ◆There seems to be a higher incidence in white people as compared to Black or Asian people. This may be due to geographic location.
- ◆Usual age of onset is between the age of 50 and 60 years. It occurs before 40 years of age in about 4% of cases.
- ◆Exposure to toxins may increase the risk of developing Parkinson's.
- ◆ People who have experienced head injury may be more likely to develop Parkinson's.

Treatment of Parkinson's disease:

Adequate rest and a balanced diet are important. Speech therapy, occupational therapy and physical therapy may help improve communication and self-care.

In most cases, medication will be required to help manage physical and mental health symptoms.
